



DIRECTIONS TO MT. DEWEY OPEN SPACE

From U.S. Hwy 24 (approaching from Colorado Springs), take the Green Mountain Falls exit (a left exit).

Follow Green Mtn. Falls Road and continue straight on Ute Pass Avenue. Take a right on Olathe Street and park near the intersection of Ann Street. To reach the trailhead, walk north on Ann Street, take a left on Grand View Avenue and the first right onto Catamount Street. Take the second right onto Mrytle Street and follow the road to the trailhead.



LEAVE NO TRACE

In 2025, this trail system was designated as a Leave No Trace Gold Standard site in partnership with the Town of Green Mountain Falls, Ute Pass Elementary School, Friends of Ute Pass Trails, and the Historic Green Mountain Falls Foundation. This nationally acclaimed environmental stewardship program encourages the conservation of nature and the protection of wildlife and open spaces. Please do your part and follow the Hiker Five guidelines and posted regulations in our parks, trails, and open spaces to minimize your impact. Watch for additional signage along the way and enjoy your time in Green Mountain Falls.

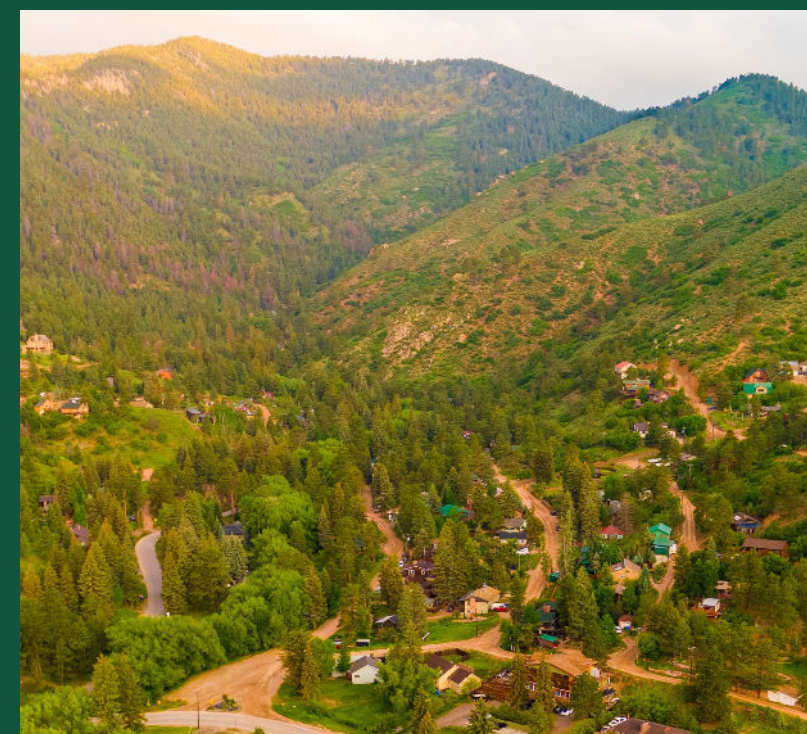
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Mt. Dewey Open Space

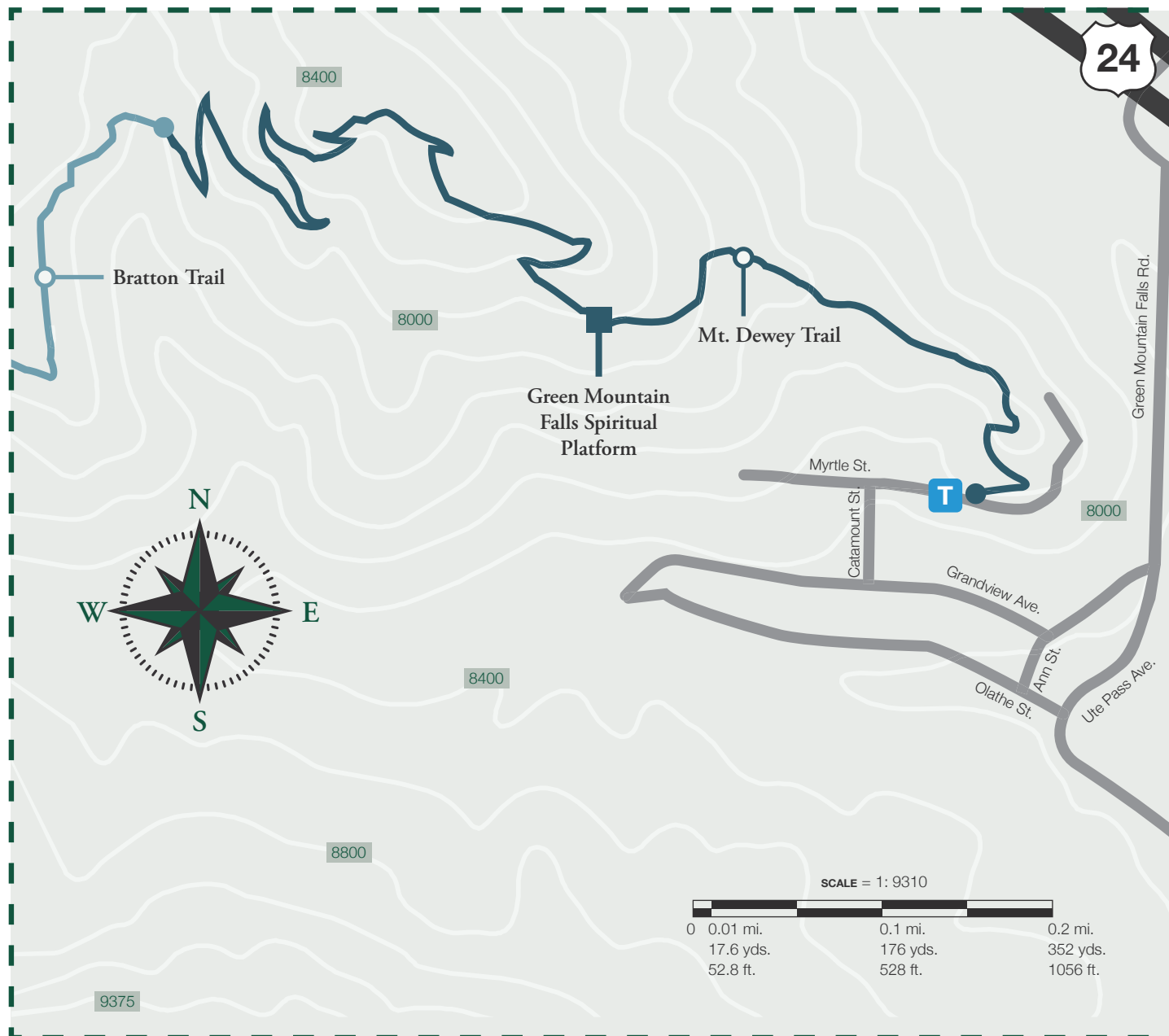


Trail Map

In 2014 the Historic Green Mountain Falls Foundation purchased 139 acres of forest land on Mt. Dewey in an effort to protect the beautiful mountain backspace from future development. Additionally, the acquisition provides open space for the residents and visitors of Green Mountain Falls with well-built,

sustainable hiking trails featuring magnificent views of the Ute Pass Valley.

The Mt. Dewey Trail completed in 2015, was designed and constructed by volunteers from the Green Mountain Falls Trails Committee and the Mile High Youth Corps. The Bratton Trail extension

was built in 2017 to thank Dick Bratton of the Green Mountain Falls Trails Committee for his years of service and commitment to furthering the beautification and accessibility of Mt. Dewey and trails throughout the Ute Pass region.

 - Plan your route using an official trail map

 - Check the weather forecast
- 4 Be Courteous**
 - Share the trail
 - Keep residential roads passable for vehicles
 - Leave what you find
- 5 Be Appreciative**
 - Participate in the quiet of the woods
 - Observe wildlife from afar
